

History of the 101st Airborne Division

The 101st Airborne Division was activated on 15 August 1943 at Camp Claiborne, Louisiana. Its first Commander, Major General William C. Lee, observed that "the 101st…has no history, but it has a rendezvous with destiny". Time and time again, the 101st has kept that rendezvous and in so doing, acquired a proud history.

The 101st moved to Fort Bragg, North Carolina, for training and successfully demonstrated its readiness during the Tennessee maneuvers of 1943. Embarking from Camp Shaw, New York in September, the 101st continued training in England until D-Day, 6 June 1944, when its pathfinders became the first Americans to set foot in occupied France.

The Screaming Eagles cleared the way for the 1st and 4th Infantry Division at Omaha and Utah beaches. After 33 days of continuous fighting, including a bitter battle for the town of Carentan, the 101st returned to England to prepare for future airborne operations. On 12 September 1944, the 101st jumped into Holland during the operation "Market Garden". Holding a narrow corridor 16 miles long through enemy territory from Eindhoven to Grave, the division fought against heavy odds for ten days. The division then continued its role in the liberation of Holland, spending a total of 72 days in combat.

In November 1944, the 101st returned to France for a well-deserved rest, only to be called to action again in the Battle of the Bulge. While defending the critical transportation hub of Bastogne, Belgium, the 101st was surrounded by advancing enemy who demanded immediate surrender. The acting Division Commander, Brigadier General Anthony C. McAuliffe, made history with his classic reply, "Nuts!" The siege was broken on 16 December 1944, but the fighting continued until 18 January 1945. After moving through Alsace and the Ruhr Valley, the 101st captured Hitler's retreating forces at Berchtesgarden. On 30 November 1945, the Screaming Eagles were inactivated.

The end of World War II marked the beginning of an intermittent existence for the 101st – several inactivations occurred during the next two decades. Official reactivation ceremonies were held on 21 September 1956, making the 101st the Army's first Pentomic division. (author unknown)

GENERAL PATTON'S PRAYER

This is the prayer Gen. George Patton requested of his chaplain during the crucial days of the Battle of Bastogne on the Western front in 1944. Overcast skies were preventing Allied air cover, and Patton's tanks, chomping to be let loose, had to be held in check. The general asked his chaplain to print 250,000 cards for each soldier in the Third Army, with the following prayer:

"Almighty and most merciful Father, we humbly beseech Thee, of Thy great goodness, to restrain these immoderate rains with which we have had to contend. Grant us fair weather for battle. Graciously hearken to us as soldiers who call upon Thee that, armed with Thy power, we may advance from victory to victory, and crush the oppression and wickedness of our enemies and establish Thy justice among men and nations."

The general's command grew out of some surprisingly clear theological reflection on his part: "Chaplain, I am a strong believer in

prayer. There are three ways that men get what they want: by planning, by working and by praying. Any great military operation takes careful planning, or thinking. Then you must have well-trained troops to carry it out; that's working. But between the plan and the operation there is always an unknown. That unknown spells defeat or victory, success or failure. It is the reaction of the actors to the ordeal when it actually comes. Some people call that getting the breaks; I call it God. God has His part, or margin, in everything. That's where prayer comes in." The prayer was said, the skies cleared and the tanks lurched forward in a race to close the trap on a German salient. It was only in keeping with a long tradition, therefore, that on the Friday following September 11, 2001, President Bush led the nation in a prayer asking the blessings of Providence upon the cause of liberty.

Veterans to be Celebrated at New Windsor Cantonment Veterans from American History will be remembered as New Windsor Cantonment State Historic Site opens for a special open house celebrating Veterans Day. From 10 am through 4 pm, living history and demonstrations highlight the first American veterans, the citizen-soldiers of America from the early 1600s through the Civil War. Historic Temple Hill, where George Washington's army spent the last years of the Revolutionary War, will be alive with activity on Thursday, November 11, in honor of American veterans of all wars. For more information, please call 845-561-1765.

The cantonment was originally home to 7,500 soldiers and 500 of their family members in 1782 and 1783, and is now home to the National Purple Heart Hall of Honor, a growing institution that gathers the stories of America's combat wounded military personnel. Guests can see exhibits on the dangers American faced during the wars of the 20th century, and learn more about the stories of some of over one and a half million recipients of the Purple Heart. A scale model displays plans for a new facility that will be the nation's only museum dedicated to those who earned the Purple Heart.

On site, guests can visit the "Temple of Virtue," re-constructed on the site of the original building, the setting of George Washington's greatest victory, the speech that held his army together when the threat of a rebellion threatened to tear the army apart. Here too the officers gathered stories of the candidates for the "Badge of Military Merit," the Continental Army's highest award for enlisted men and the inspiration for the modern Purple Heart.

The public is also encouraged to thank veterans personally by attending one of the many local ceremonies honoring veterans at 11 am. Each year, Veterans Day is celebrated at the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month, corresponding with the anniversary of the Armistice, the peace that ended World War I.

Located at 374 Temple Hill Road (Route 300), the historic site was the final winter encampment of the American Revolution. The National Purple Heart Hall of Honor is actively collecting the names and stories of recipients for inclusion in an interactive computer archive, museum exhibits and educational programs for students and the general public.
