. Air Assault on 24 April, 2008

I had the honor of going into an air assault on one of



many helicopters bearing two rifle companies of 2/506th. The target area was a village 45 minutes by air from Kandahar. It is suspected that the Taliban is making bombs to plant on Highway A-1 there, and using the area as a sanctuary. We hit a cold LZ and mostly discovered that the locals were hiding and the Taliban had retreated to caves in a nearby mountain. I took the photo above that afternoon, after elements of B Co. had secured the village. This assault was uneventful, although one of the Terps (Afghani interpreters) threw-up in his chopper enroute to the LZ, causing several B Co. men to also toss their cookies. Fortunately, this didn't happen on the bird I was riding-in.

Much more photo coverage will be presented in my books, which I hope to have in print before Christmas of 2009.

Flying over to the middle east with 1st Bn 506th from Ft Campbell, we rode commercial airliners (Miami Air), but starting in Manas and on my return flights with the 508th, it was all military aircraft (C-17's and one C-5). Going over, it took us 6 days to get to our ultimate destinations, after being stuck 3 nights in Manas and several more in Bagram. In fact 1st Bn was still awaiting flights to FOB Salerno at the time I left them for Kandahar. Coming back, I was two nights in Bagram, three in Manas and one in Germany.

WARSAW (Reuters) - Irena Sendler, a Polish woman who saved thousands of Jewish children during World War Two by smuggling them out of the Warsaw Ghetto, died in the Polish capital on Monday after a long illness, local media said.

Israel's Holocaust remembrance authority, Yad Vashem, said in a statement that it mourned her death.

The web portal of Poland's leading daily, Gazeta Wyborcza, said Sendler, 98, died in Plocka Street hospital early on Monday. The hospital declined to comment on the report.

Yad Vashem chairman Avner Shalev said: "Irena Sendler's courageous activities rescuing Jews during the Holocaust serve as a beacon of light to the world, inspiring hope and restoring faith in the innate goodness of mankind."

Using her position as a social worker, Sendler regularly entered the ghetto, smuggling around 2,500 children out in boxes, suitcases or hidden in trolleys.

The children were then placed with Polish families outside the ghetto, created by Nazi Germany in 1940 for the city's half a million strong Jewish population, and given new identities.

But in 1943 Sendler, who led the children' section of the Zegota organization which helped Jews during the war, was arrested and tortured by the Gestapo.

She only escaped execution when Zegota managed to bribe some Nazi officials, who left her unconscious but alive with broken legs and arms in the woods.

"People who stand up for others, for the weak, are very rare. The world would have been a better place if there were more of them," Marek Edelman, the last surviving commander of the Warsaw Ghetto Uprising, said on national television.

His sentiments were echoed by former Polish President Lech Walesa as well as religious leaders.

Sendler was honored with Israeli Yad Vashem Righteous Among the Nations medal in 1965 for her actions, and later made an honorary Israeli citizen.

She was also nominated for the Nobel Peace Price last year but, despite her bravery, she denied she was a hero.

"The term 'hero' irritates me greatly. The opposite is true. I continue to have pangs of conscience that I did so little," Sendler said in one of her last interviews. (Writing by Gabriela Baczynska; Editing by Jon

A nationwide effort to thank WWII vets got its start in Enon

Earl Morse wants to fly 20,000 veterans to see the WWII memorial by year's end

The din of chatter aboard the Boeing 717 comes to a
hush as Jim Salamon delivers the prayer given at the
start of every Honor Flight.

"Lord, our Heavenly Father ... we pray that we have a safe and injury-free day and that you bring our precious cargo safely home to their loved ones."

Salamon, director of Dayton operations, carries on the tradition Honor Flight founder Earl Morse started. Prayer is part of the tradition, along with preparations that start months in advance.

Honor Flight runs trips out of Dayton International Airport once a month from April through November. On this May 3 flight, two nurses are aboard along with Dr. Jane Morford of Beavercreek, who is making her third trip as a guardian.

As the AirTran Airways plane touches down in Baltimore, Honor Flight volunteers and people waiting on flights greet the veterans streaming into the terminal.

Built with 300 tons of granite, the memorial honors the 16 million Americans who served in the armed forces and the millions who supported the war effort at home. More than \$197 million was raised, mostly private donations through a campaign co-chaired by former Sen. Bob Dole, a decorated World War II veteran.

The Honor Flight Network got its start on Earl Morse's dining room table in Enon. Like all great ideas, it started small. The first flight, in May 2005, brought 12 veterans to the memorial. Three years later, thanks to word of mouth and some national publicity, it has grown into a network of 71 hubs operating in 31 states. Morse is striving to have hubs in all 50 states by the end of the year.

Morse had nearly 30 years of caring for veterans when he launched Honor Flight as a nonprofit. He spent 21 years in the Air Force as a medic and physician assistant, and later worked eight years for Veterans Affairs.

The Springfield office receives 20 to 40 veterans applications a day from across the country. e can get the applications, but if we don't have places to get them out there, we're not going to be able to get them as expeditiously as possible," Bailey said. The growth is all the more impressive when you consider

this: No veteran is charged to go. Morse refuses to accept money from any World War II veteran making the one-day trip.

Although costs have skyrocketed, the program has been able to rely on private contributions. "When you're going from a basically local organization, which this started out as, to a national organization, it's a lot of growing pains," bookkeeper Tom O'Neal said. Morse said Honor Flight brought in about \$750,000 in donations last year, including from organizations like the VFW of Ohio. Contributions have come in from a middle school in Alabama, which raised \$11,000 for a flight, to Daniel L. Whitney, better known as Larry the Cable guy, who paid \$76,000 for a charter flight out of Nebraska last week.



We have learned from the newsletter "Nieuws/News", of the Association for Adopting Graves at the American Cemetery, Margarten, Netherlands, April 2008

A milestone reached With the allocation of the adoption of the remaining graves at the American Cemetery, the foundation has reached its first milestone. Almost all 8,301 graves of fallen American liberators have been adopted. A certificate with details of the adopted, as mentioned on the grave stones has gone out to not only to the adoptive fathers who not only live in the Netherlands and Belgium, but certificates have even found their way to Germany, France and Switzerland Providing that these adoptive fathers are able to meet the requirements.

The Walls of the Missing The Board of the American Cemetery has agreed, that also the names of the fallen liberators on the Walls of the Missing can be put up for adoption. In these wall s the names of 1,722 fallen American liberators are carved, whose bodies have never been found or could not have been identified, the so-called Missing. 48 names are marked with a bronze rosette, meaning that they



have been recovered at a later stage. For the adoption of the names on the Walls of the Missing the normal rules apply. For this the adoptive father will also receive a certificate with details of the missing liberator.

- it is not allowed to bring pets to the cemetery
- · 4 women are buried in the cemetery of Margraten
- 40 pairs of brothers are buried alongside each other during the ceremony
- on Memorial Day as well as during the Requiem the cemetery is open to all public
- over 100 names on the Walls of the Missing already have been adopted by friends of the Jack Million Band; a Limburgian band containing of professional musicians form Maastricht and surroundings.
- They regularly perform Glenn Miller music in America.
- the foundation has purchased over 1,000 vases
- · all work of the foundation is done by volunteers

Never to be Forgotten Strangers across the sea remember sacrifices of American soldiers

The Netherlands. (Bart Dilweg / Contributed) Doran, as a member of the 502nd Parachute Infantry Regiment (101st Airborne Division) was part of the invasion force at Normandy. In fact, he was one of the "pathfinders" who were among the first to parachute into Normandy - before the formal invasion started - in order to mark landing zones for the troops to follow. A few months later he parachuted behind enemy lines in The Netherlands as part of Operation Market Garden. Doran was the radio operator for Lt. Col. Robert G. Cole, who later received the Medal of Honor. During a firefight on Sept. 18, Doran had to adjust his position to improve radio reception and was struck and killed by a sniper's bullet. Twenty minutes later, Lt. Col. Cole was killed in a similar manner.

Runway at Amsterdam's Schiphol Airport closed after World War II bomb unearthed

AMSTERDAM, Netherlands - Amsterdam's Schiphol Airport has closed one of its five runways after a World War II bomb was unearthed during excavations nearby.

Army explosives experts say the 500-pound (226-kilogram) British bomb must remain still for 54 hours because it was moved during its discovery by workers building a road.

Bert van Denham from the local municipality says the bomb is expected to be removed on Thursday. Schiphol spokeswoman Kathelijne Vermeulen said Tuesday that flights are

being diverted to other runways at the airport and no delays are expected.

CITATION FOR THE AWARD OF THE DUTCH ORANGE LANYARD

Awarded under Ministerial Decree No. P 203, 20 September 1945, by the Netherlands Minister of War.

Under authority contained in TWX, file SC 32869, United States Forces, European Theatre (Main) dated 27 November 1945, the Orange Lanyard is awarded to THE 101ST AIRBORNE DIVISION by the Dutch Government for the period 17 September to 27 November 1944. All personnel of THE 101ST AIRBORNE DIVISION who participated in the liberation of Holland during the period cited above are authorized to wear the Orange Lanyard, with the following Citation:

Acknowledging that the outstanding performance of duty of THE 101ST AIRBORNE DIVISION, UNITED STATES ARMY, during the Airborne operations and the grimly determined fighting actions in the southern part of the Netherlands in the period from 17 September to 28 November 1944, has greatly contributed to the liberation of that part of the country; acknowledging also, that it is appropriate for each member of the Division who took part in the aforesaid operations, to possess a lasting memento in remembrance of this memorable struggle; decrees: That each member of THE 101ST AIRBORNE DIVISION, UNITED STATES ARMY, who took part in the operations in the southern part of the Netherlands in the period from 17 September to 28 November 1944, is authorized to wear the Orange Lanyard of the Royal Netherlands Army.

CITATION FOR THE AWARD OF THE BELGIAN FOURRAGERE 1940

THE MINISTER OF NATIONAL DEFENSE has the honor to inform the Commanding General of the 101st Airborne Division that, by order No. 1196 of his Royal Highness The Prince Regent, dated 22 October 1945, the 101st Airborne Division and attached units are cited twice in the Order of the Day of the Belgian Army with the award of THE FOURRAGERE 1940, for:

- 1) "THE 101ST AIRBORNE DIVISION US ARMY, landed by parachute and glider on the coast of France, 6 June 1944, and was one of the first to attack the enemy in the campaign which later liberated Europe which was occupied by the Germans. It was necessary that small detachments enter into fierce combat in many places in order to reach and unite at their assembly points. Many casualties were inflicted upon the enemy and many casualties were sustained by the division while it subdued enemy strongpoints, attacked and held vital communication centers, bridges and observation points. The success with which these missions were accomplished hindered the enemy from using reinforcements which could have caused the failure of the landing of the VII U.S. Corp, which later participated in the liberation of Belgium."

THE MINISTER OF NATIONAL DEFENSE has the honor to inform the Commanding General of the 101st Airborne Division that, by order No. 828 of his Royal Highness The Prince Regent, dated 30 July 1945, his division is cited in the Order of the Day of the Belgian Army with the award of the Croix de Guerre 1940, with Palm for:

"By it's splendid resistance from 22 to 27 December 1944, in the most arduous fighting in the Battle of the Ardennes, where it held, completely isolated, the key position of Bastogne, the 101ST AIRBORNE DIVISION U.S. ARMY, with attached units foiled the enemy's plans which required a complete penetration of Belgium, and served as a pivot for the Allied counter offensive which liberated the invaded territories.

During these defensive operations, by their courage, their endurance, their discipline, and the knowledge of the use of their weapons, repulsing the incessant attacks led by elements of eight German divisions, in spite of shortages of food and material, these troops and their leaders have written one of the most glorious pages of military history, and acquired, along with the admiration of the world the everlasting gratitude of Belgium

Awarded under Decision No. 367, 22 July 1946, by the President of the Provisional Government of the French Republic, with the following Citation:


THE 502ND PARACHUTE INFANTRY REGIMENT, a splended Airborne unit gave proof of extraordinary heroism in the course of the Normandy landing operations on 6 June to July 8, 1944. It parachuted before dawn behind the assault beach on 6 June and in spite of widely scattered parachute drops, succeeded in regrouping into small and effective fighting units. Attacked by enemy forces with violent fire, it nevertheless occupied positions of strategic importance for the landing of Allied seaborne troops. This action opened the way to La Douve and to the road leading to Carentan, essential for a later assault. In this way, THE 502ND PARACHUTE INFANTRY REGIMENT greatly contributed to the first phase of the liberation of France.
